Our Place in Time....

Sir John Nelthorpe School is thrilled to announce the launch of its '**Our Place in Time**' campaign. The campaign aims to raise the funds needed to redevelop the original school building and the adjoining performing arts facility to create a multi-purpose community meeting and resource centre, a community accessible professional performing arts facility and finally to re-instate main door into the school off Grammar School Road as the main entrance to the School for all visitors.

This campaign is being spearheaded by former pupil of Sir John Nelthorpe School and leader of North Lincolnshire Council, Cllr Rob Waltham (MBE), with the full support and input of the

Foundation Governors, School Governors and the Briggensians Association Committee. This all coincides very appropriately with the celebrations we are planning for Summer 2019, when the Lower School on Wrawby Road will reach its 100th year of existence (formerly Brigg Girls' High School) and the Upper School will reach its 350th year of existence (formerly, Brigg Boys Grammar School). We have a number of exciting plans in place to ensure this time next year will be a time to remember for many years to come.

Our target is £420,000 which includes £412,000 for the refurbishment works and a further £8,000 for contingency as developments take shape. We have already secured £100,000 towards this figure and our main fundraising activities haven't even started yet, so I am very hopeful that we can do this!

During the course of the campaign, there will be regular updates and information, such as more detail on the plans and on how to contribute on both our School Website and through our Future First Alumni facility.

This is the most transformative investment in the school's more recent history, almost a re-foundation, and I hope that you will feel moved to be a part of it. This is your chance to make your mark. This truly is now 'OUR place in time' to make more history for this wonderful seat of learning

2017/18 Fundraising - The Story So Far...

The fundraising total for this academic year so far is **£4981.32**

Well done to everyone for their fantastic fundraising efforts and thank you to those families who have contributed to SJN School Fund. Funds raised at events this year will have supported contributions to LIVES, The Health Tree Foundation, Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance, Macmillan and The British Heart Foundation (through the imminent purchase of a new defibrillator for the school). Contributions to School Fund are being put to good use under Student Council direction and this year will be spent primarily on improving outdoor spaces. A new seating area will be installed shortly and we hope all students will enjoy this additional investment and will value the new space. We are also investigating the costing and provision of an additional water dispenser to be located at the Upper School at which students can fill up their drinks bottles at break times.

Holocaust Memorial Design (by Mrs Hanson, Art)

Earlier in the year we were approached by leaders of Brigg Council who were looking for local artists and designers to submit ideas for a piece of artwork which would act as a memorial to those who lost their lives or lived to survive the Holocaust, and would be installed in a special area of the Millennium Green in Brigg. This was a fantastic opportunity for our school to be involved in a community project and I selected a group of Y9 pupils who could combine their knowledge of The Holocaust from their RE lessons with their Art and Design skills.



Each member of the group worked hard to produce high quality, thought-provoking designs which I was very proud to present to Brigg Town Council. The council received over sixty entries, some from professional artists, so I was delighted that they have chosen to go ahead with a design by a Sir John Nelthorpe pupil!

With fresh air that fills yours lungs whole.


Winter...

Parent Views - Helping us to help you

Thank you to the 159 parents who took the time to complete our annual survey; the results of which are shown in the chart below. As you can see the overwhelming response was positive with over 95% of parents who responded recommending our school. However, as we aspire to be outstanding we continue to adapt and reflect on your valuable feedback.

From September, all students will receive a personal timetable setting out the amount and frequency of homework each subject will set each week. We want students to become independent learners, developing the abilities they have, by applying them outside of the classroom. Regular homework is both important and necessary and throughout secondary school can be equivalent to a year's valuable study.

We now report on students' progress three times a year and all parents have the opportunity to attend Progress Evenings to discuss their child's progress. Parents can also contact either their child's teacher or Key Stage 3 Learning Coordinator, Mrs Cook or the Key Stage 4 Learning Coordinator, Ms Gillies at any time if they have any concerns.



Fortis et Fidelis

The award that EVERY STUDENT SHOULD RECEIVE.....???

At each of the three assessment points each year, we ask teachers to comment on their students' **attitude to learning**. Where a student's attitude to learning is graded as 'excellent' - described as **"always showing high levels of effort, has a conscientious attitude to their studies, completes tasks on time and an exemplary standard of behaviour"** across all of their subjects they are awarded with the 'Fortis et Fidelis' certificate in recognition of this achievement. This is an award that has nothing to do with academic ability. Everyone really does have the same opportunity to strive for this prestigious award. There is also now a 'Hall of Fame' display in the New Block for students who achieve a certain level of excellent attitude to learning grades, ranging from Bronze, to Silver, to Gold and then to the ultimate 'Fortis et Fidelis' pinnacle. 
It is also an opportunity for the development of friendships and meeting their peers. Our current Year 7 students have reflected on their first year and shared their views, we are sure the new intake will feel the same

This year was the schools 39th annual trip to the Outward Bound Trust and the weather could not have been kinder. 36 year 8 students and 3 staff, travelled to the Outward Bound Centre at Ullswater in the beautiful Lake District via mini-bus with the obligatory bacon sandwich stop at Scotch Corner! The weekend was filled with challenge and adventure; arriving at the Centre the students were quickly allocated groups and then ushered to stores, to pack and prep for an



overnight expedition. All groups bivouacked (made their own shelters), two groups journeyed across the lake via canoe and built camp in the woods at the lake shore, with the other group taking on the challenge of team work, rowing across the lake to then hike up Hallin Fell, where camp was built for the night, on top of the mountain! On Saturday after an excellent night's sleep under the stars, the staff and students embarked on an action filled day, ghyll scrambling, canoeing, rowing, climbing, a trip in a power boat and jumping off a cliff into Ullswater. After the evening meal the students took

part in a range of activities including nightline, orienteering and a walk to the waterfalls.

Sunday brought fine weather with a cloud inversion over the lake (for those up early enough to witness it), with the groups then taking part in rock climbing, canoeing, power boating and cliff jumping. A higher proportion of our students move on to the prestigious 'Russell Group' Universities after their A Level studies than from any other sixth form provider in the area.

We don't 'demand' that our students wishing to pursue an A Level route after GCSE choose our sixth form, but we do expect it — because we know students who do, do well here.

First ever Italy tour - A resounding 'sports and culture' success



56 students and 6 members of staff travelled to Lake Garda for a football & netball tour. The students had time to visit Juliet's balcony in Verona, shopping and sightseeing in Milan and a tour of San Siro stadium before any sport even took place. All students received two hours of coaching in their sports throughout the week as well as playing matches against Italian teams. The Y11 boy's football team, which included two Y10 students played three matches winning 4-2, 5-2 and drawing the last 3-3 after battling back from 3-1 down. The Y9/10 team also played three matches losing the first 4-0, winning the second 4-2 and narrowly losing the 3rd 2-1. The three netball teams all took part in a tournament on the 4th day. The two Y10/11 teams battled it out in the morning and even played each other. The standard was very high and our girls finished 7th and 8th. The Y9 girls took to the court in the afternoon and were very impressive from the first game. A number of wins and a couple of narrow defeats meant they just missed out on securing 3rd place and had to settle for 4th. The 56 students who attended the trip were an absolute credit to the school throughout the trip and hopefully will have fond memories of their experience on the trip for years to come.
